NAPA/SOLANO AREA AGENCY ON AGING MEETING PROTOCOL IN RESPONSE TO CORONAVIRUS COVID 19

California Governor Gavin Newsom issued Executive Order N-25-20 on March 12, 2020, relating to the convening of public meetings in light of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Napa/Solano Area Agency on Aging hereby provides notice that it will continue to convene its regularly scheduled public meetings of the Oversight Board and the Advisory Council telephonically, as provided in the publicly posted agenda notice, and until further notice. Pursuant to the Executive Order, and to maintain the orderly conduct of the meeting, the Napa/Solano Area Agency on Aging will allow Board members and Council members to attend the meetings telephonically and to participate in the meetings to the same extent as if they were present.

Members of the public who wish to participate may participate telephonically. For members of the public who wish to participate but not to attend telephonically, you may submit written comments on any matter within the Board or Council's subject matter jurisdiction, regardless of whether it is on the agenda for Board or Council consideration or action, and those comments will be entered into the administrative record of the meeting. To submit written comments by U.S. Mail or email for inclusion in the meeting record, they must be received by the Napa/ Solano Area Agency on Aging staff no later than 9:00 a.m. on the morning prior to the noticed meeting. Agencies partner to help Parkway Plaza residents enjoy Straight Out of Lockdown

FAIRFIELD — It was Straight Out of Lockdown for the approximate 140 seniors at Parkway Plaza on Friday afternoon.

It marked the first time, since the pandemic, residents were able to gather, without masks, in a group.

The smiles flowed as freely as ice-cold water.

Canopies were set up over tables in the courtyard, in view of a garden that grew during the pandemic, offering residents a chance to get outside in fresh air.

A variety of organizations sponsored the fun, including CalFresh, Innovative Health Solutions and the Napa-Solano Area Agency on Aging.

Innovative Health Solutions paired with Sustainable Solano to expand the garden. Innovative Health Solutions collaborates with public health organizations, businesses, health care professions, community members and advocates to improve the health and wellness of Bay Area residents.

The goal is to have gardens at other affordable senior complexes, said Norma Lisenko, of Innovative Health Solutions.

She was accompanied by a bevy of soft-bound books on topics such as healthy cooking, yoga and strength training that were free. There were also recipe cards.

"One of us can't do it all," she said. "We can when we partner together."

Donna Soltis, an eight-year resident, was happy to see her neighbors, unmasked.

Her main reason for attending the celebration?

"The lockdown is over," she said.

Martha Farr moved in a few months before the pandemic and only had a short time to meet her neighbors.

She was never lonely. Her neighbors check in with her constantly.

"I get to see everyone," she said.

Loretta Girka, the complex's youngest resident, credited her caregiver Laura Davalos and her neighbors for keeping her sanity during the shutdown.

"We kept each other's spirits up," Davalos said.

"We are starting to get lively again," Girka added.

Byron Kamelamela was happy to shed his mask. In jest, he said some residents, including himself, should keep their masks on as to not reveal their looks.

"There's some good-looking people here who should take it off," he said.

He did carry a mask in his pocket, just in case.

"Just to be here and see everyone," was his main reason for attending.

Cody Mott got to show off his new motorized wheelchair, which includes Bluetooth technology, the ability to lift his foot and a back that reclines.

He underwent a liver and kidney transplant a decade ago. He got a new titanium knee six years ago.

His right leg was amputated in February.

"I'm here by the grace of God," he said. "He got me through."

Jennalee Dawson, the resident service coordinator at Parkway Plaza, told the crowd it had been a difficult year for communities across the world.

"Over this past year, we as a community, have suffered losses of members of our community, who will forever be with us," she said. "Yet, through this all we gained resilience and fostered the true meaning of community."

She thanked various community agencies for their support and noted 95% of the residents are vaccinated thanks to Kaiser Permanente's MyCareMyHome program.

"Let's eat and have a good time and reconnect," Dawson concluded.

And that's what they did.



Senior financial assistance ends soon

FAIRFIELD — The Napa Solano Area Agency on Aging continues to play a role in helping low-income seniors remain in their homes by supporting small home improvement projects for Solano and Napa County residents.

The program, funded

by federal CARES Act dollars, ends soon.

The funds were originally set aside to help older adults with one-time emergencies and rental assistance. The list of covered emergency funding needs quickly grew to include assistance paying medical bills, roof repairs, utility bills and hot water heater repairs.

One example is a woman, 64, who worked two and three jobs all her life to make ends meet.

A hip injury forced her to to live on a combination of workers' compensation and state disability. The ongoing medical treatments, coupled with the need for dental work before being approved for surgery, left her unable to

One example is a keep up on her monthly man, 64, who worked utility bill.

The Senior Emergency Assistance Program was able to assist her.

The program began as a recommendation from the Advisory Council on Aging and Legal Services of Northern California. When the Napa/Solano

Area Agency on Aging received additional CARES Act funds, both the Advisory Council on Aging and local service providers were asked to suggest the best uses for allocating the funds.

The program is administered through the Benicia Family Resource Center.

Qualifying individuals must be low-income, 60 years or older, or

a disabled adult with a qualifying need.
Assistance is available to qualified individuals who need one-time assistance.

The program has been in place since January and will end in September.

All seniors who need help are encouraged to apply early, while funds are available
